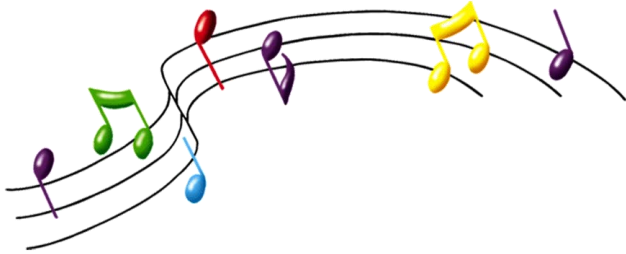

Soon to be opening in Athol near the Market Basket, we decided to “try it out” and see whether we will like it.

All I can say is it was OK. But, I don't think it will be successful in Athol. The prices for lunch were quite high. Sandwiches ranged \$12 to \$15. Entrees were \$15 to \$18. I had a Salmon special and it was \$20. The waitress said it is “cooked soft” was that OK. I said “I'd like it cooked a little more”. And they did, it was almost burnt on the edges and very dry. Not impressed.

They are so conscience about allergies, wanting to make sure no one had an allergy and their food would be served without ‘touching’ anything to contaminate it. I told the waitress I was allergic to “garlic”. She said my dinner would come with a special marking, “allergy free”. Guess that didn't count for the homemade bread she brought because she put it down and a plate of butter which she said was their specialty. I asked whether it had garlic and she almost fainted. OMG, she said, yes it does I will get you regular butter immediately, didn't take her long to forget about the allergy.

The bread was so good we even got a second helping. That filled me up and I was not able to have dessert but we were celebrating my friend's birthday so I told her to try one of their desserts. She loved the “Caramelized Banana Flatbread” which was cinnamon sugared Naan bread, loaded with Nutella, sea salt caramel, caramelized bananas and dusted with powdered sugar. I had a couple bites and it was very tasty.

I checked online their dinner menu and found the prices quite high also. Steaks run \$24 to \$32, Fish \$22-\$24, miscellaneous entrees \$16 - \$22. They are expecting to open early in 2018 in Athol but in the meantime you can check them out at other locations, closest being Leominster near the Cinema. Bon Appetite.

GRADES 5 and 6: As we kick off this year's school-wide theme of "Digging Deeper," 5th and 6th grade will literally be digging deeper! Our next science unit will be to revisit what we have previously learned about decomposers and composting as we prepare our two garden composting bins for a longer term study.

Many of our families and community members already compost. WCS has been composting garden, lunch, and snack scraps for years. But what are the organisms that are responsible for creating healthy compost? What else does healthy compost need? Which of our two composters do we predict will compost more completely and why? How can we design an experiment to test that? How often should we check back with them to see what is happening? How can we tell that decomposition is happening? How can we measure the rate of decomposition? These are the questions we will try to answer as we literally "dig deeper".

We are also digging deeper in the figurative sense. Students brainstormed several important topics that have been in the news lately. They then narrowed them down to three that they wanted to dig deeper into. After choosing and researching both sides of one issue, each student will write his or her own research-based argument essay for the side that they chose. These are tough topics and most articles written on either side of any of these issues are in publications for adult readers. Students will dig deep within themselves and find the perseverance it takes to tackle these texts.

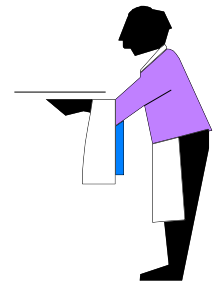

Dear Friends,

Ah, you know it yourself, Lord, through having borne the anguish of it as a man: on certain days the world seems a terrifying thing: huge, blind and brutal...at any moment the vast and horrible thing may break in through the cracks – the thing which we try hard to forget is always there, separated from us by a flimsy partition: fire, pestilence, storm, earthquakes or the unleashing of dark moral forces – these callously sweep away in one moment what we had laboriously built up and beautified with all our intelligence and all our love.

Since my human dignity, O God, forbids me to close my eyes to this...teach me to adore it by seeing you concealed within it.” Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (1881-1955) French philosopher, scientist and Jesuit priest

FEAR! Is there a more powerful emotion in the human heart? It is used to motivate and it is used to incapacitate. It is used to separate and it is used to coalesce. Teilhard acknowledges that there are reasons to be fearful, the ever present possibility that “at any moment the vast and horrible thing may break in through the cracks.” We have seen this happening with some frequency lately; hurricanes, devastating wild fires, floods and mudslides, earthquakes. We have seen violent civil unrest and horrific attacks on innocent people; much to be feared. So where can one find God within these unsettling events?

During World War II, Winston Churchill told the British people, “*We have nothing to fear but fear itself.*” He said this in the darkest days of the war when it looked as though Germany just might invade England and win the war. Was he crazy? Or was he aware that fear can paralyze an intended victim and what England needed to do at that moment was to stand fast with determination, as a unified society.

One of the most frequently recurring pronouncements in the Bible is; **FEAR NOT.** In one form or another, that admonition occurs throughout the whole Bible, from Noah to Abraham, from Moses through the Prophets to the Gospel accounts of Jesus, and into the last chapters of the Book of Revelations. Don't be afraid. I believe that is what Teilhard is saying (although I would not have used the words “adore it”), don't become paralyzed, don't become indifferent, insensitive to injustice, and don't become isolated, cynical and self-serving. Don't be afraid, because there is a more powerful force in creation and a more powerful emotion than fear within the human heart; love. Look for it in the moment of terrorizing gun fire, as someone risks their own safety to help another. Look for it when a neighbor helps a neighbor escape a raging fire, when a community comes together to support a grieving family, when an organization reaches out to those devastated by storms and earthquakes. Look for it and then join in selflessly. Don't make a big show of how magnanimous you are, how special you are; that's an expression of nothing but self-love.

And be thankful for all those around you who are also expressing love in selfless and even self-sacrificing ways. Meister Eckhart, 13th century German Christian mystic, said “*If the only prayer you say in your entire life is ‘thank you’, that will suffice.*” Seeing divine love in all things, all people, all of creation, and expressing thanks in words and acts of compassion and justice in your own life is what Teilhard and Eckhart and Gandhi and Jesus and the Buddha and all truly great people have exemplified with their lives and words.

This Thanksgiving, let's give heartfelt thanks for those who exemplify true love through acts of selfless giving and make a vow to search for the good in all that happens in our lives and increase our own loving compassion without seeking reward or recognition.
