This is one of the places I discovered on my Country Roads Christmas Tour. I knew about it as the owner is the daughter of my old bowling captain. Decided to stop in for lunch on the Christmas Tour. The whole place has been remodeled since Country Mischief owned it. Spaces are bigger and rooms wide open. The porch was in the process of being 'winterized' so that can be used also. They serve breakfast and lunch all day. I chose lunch when I was there and selected a burger. Burgers are served on Brioche bun, Little Leaf lettuce, sliced tomato, red onion with choice of chips, green salad, fresh fruit or House cut fries +\$1. Their menu consists of a page of breakfast items and their lunch menu consists of soups & salads, sandwiches, burgers and yummy looking desserts. Breakfast items are price ranged \$8 to \$12 and lunch items from \$12 to \$16.

My burger was excellent and the fries very tasty but could have been a little thicker for my palate. I must say, I had no room for dessert after eating the burger and fries. Next time, it's salad so I can try a dessert.

It's a short ride to Templeton Center from Warwick but may be really busy on the weekend. Call ahead and you might be able to put your name on a list. We had quite a wait when we 'dropped in', so since it was cool but sunny, in November, we sat on the lawn in chairs for the wait. They also have entertainment during the summer months, with picnic tables in the yard. I highly recommend giving it a try. I think you will enjoy it. Bon Appetit.

CEMETERY COMMISSION NEWS

We have been looking into our price structure for sale of lots and burial fees to bring them more up to date. After doing research into what other area towns charge, we find our fees are much lower than average in this area and are far lower than what larger towns charge. Our burial fees are basically level funded, what we receive is what is paid out for digging, with no revenue to add to cemetery funds.

The sale of lots is divided into a sale of lots account that leaves money available for cemetery use and a perpetual care fund where only the interest is available for use. Our current prices have served us for basic needs until now however as our cemetery is filling up we are looking to expand into section 8 (the field in the south west corner) and the need to put an access road through that area. We are also having some much needed tree work done through out the cemetery. Beginning in January 2022 the fee for each single grave will be \$425 to be divided with \$325 into sale of cemetery lots and \$100 into perpetual care. Burial fees will be \$450 for a full burial with marking and digging remaining the same and \$150 to go into sale of cemetery lots. Burial fees for cremations will be \$200 with marking and digging remaining the same and \$100 to go into sale of cemetery lots.

And thank you to those who helped with fall cleanup. I would like to take a moment to recognize Beth Gilgun and all the help she gave me navigating town finances when I came to the commission. Beth always answered my questions and a few times walked over and knocked on my door to have me correct something. She also took cemetery commission calls that came to the town hall and got the message to me and was always there to help families after funeral gatherings. Thank you, Beth. Warwick School Renewal News - February 2022

Good news: An **after-school program** will begin in Warwick on March 2nd! The Warwick Cultural Council (a local chapter of the MA Cultural Council) awarded a grant that will fund an after-school program for Warwick children beginning on Wednesday, March 2nd continuing each Wednesday until the end of the school year. The program will begin again when school starts in September and continue through December 2022.

The grant was written by Ed. Committee member Janice Starmer and awarded to the Warwick Arts Council, which will also be donating funds for materials. The afternoon program will include one hour of art, plus time for exercise, play, socializing, and time in the library to read, do homework. Details are being worked out now. Janice (an accomplished artist) will coordinate the program and teach the classes. She is looking for other artists to join in plus people who would like to help. The bus will drop off enrolled children at Warwick Community School **(WCS)** for supervised activities until 5-5:30 p.m. (parent pick-up).

For more info plus signup forms, contact: Janice via email at hotble.com. The signup forms will also be at the library. The program is open to all Warwick children in K- 6 grades from any school program. If space is available, Orange students can participate.

More good news: the Summer Program at WCS returns!

The Warwick Arts Council received another grant from the Warwick Cultural Council (also written by Janice Starmer) to fund a **3-week summer 2022 session**. Selectboard member Brian Snell and Janice will coordinate with Antioch University joining the program team again. Details coming.



A second day of after-school programming will be starting up soon, likely on Fridays. This will focus on outdoor/nature activities. Email Janice if interested. More details soon.

Volunteers –parents, grandparents, or community members - are needed for the after-school and summer programs to help with library staffing, answering phones and being another set of hands. Please contact Janice or Adam Holloway (contact info below).

Warwick school planners have re-energized to find a way for our youngest children to have elementary public education in Warwick starting in the fall of 2022. Warwick has one more full school year as part of the Pioneer district. Our 2022 goals include providing not only after school & summer programs, but also early child-hood at WCS and at least kindergarten. The four committees involved are coordinating with the Pioneer district and continuing to address the many transition steps needed for complete K-6 public education to start in Warwick beginning with the 2023-24 school year. To help us plan, **please help us identify children 4 - 6 years old** entering school for the first time in kindergarten or 1st grade, especially families new to town. Contact info is below.

THANK YOU to all who wrote DESE letters and signed the petition – it helped! Officials from DESE were very aware of communications supporting Warwick's efforts.

We in town government made a clerical error last year when calculating the taxes. I did not notice it and the state did not either. My friend and former treasurer said online something to the effect that it would be nice if the error were in the taxpayer's favor for once. Well, it was, and we did not even notice until a year later. That omission undercharged the taxpayers last year by about \$2 per thousand. It felt good. It was \$160,000 of revenue we did not bill or collect. And even so we ended the year with a small surplus. That was the pandemic effect. Underspending budgets. Tax rate setting has been done correctly this year. It was an increase over last year. To further confuse things this is a revaluation year. Revaluation is coming. But in the meantime, knowing the upward price trend we applied a desk job 10 percent across the board valuation increase. That was to keep us closer to 100% full fair value. Assessing provides the basis to distribute the tax burden.

March 28 at 7 pm at the school the Selectboard have scheduled a special town meeting to appropriate funds to pay Warwick's share of Pioneer's School System debt which was assumed to cover the district's FY18 deficit. The amount of our share is about \$35k and we must pay it this year or get more delay in departing the regional district. The other matter is to approve acquisition of donated forest land. This is part of the Landscape Partnership award we sought with Mt Grace Land Trust and Mass Audubon. While TM voted to allow the Selectboard to apply for and expend grants, there is special protection in the law to prevent unwanted conveyances of real property, so we need a Town Meeting vote just as we sought when we acquired the Vic Shaw property.

So much loss of Warwick friends and loved ones has happened in the past weeks with Oliver Fellows, Carol Kahler, Miryam Williamson, Gunnar Lambert, Martha Kitchen, and Beth Gilgun passing. It was Beth who so often lately organized and staffed the kitchen for many memorial receptions. And she took on all manner of business that came to the town hall. There was no January newsletter because of her death. We were not ready. She was Assessor, Assessor's Clerk, Treasurer, and more. Friends will gather sometime in the Spring to remember her.

Here is one for the win column; we finally got good mobile cellular. If you want service get yourself over to AT&T or an MVNO (mobile virtual network operator) who operate on AT&T facilities. This could be AT&T or AT&T prepaid and include mobile virtual operators like TracFone, and Consumer Cellular. Terry K got a lot of folks on prepaid phones on Verizon because it used to be the best of the worst for getting service in town. Now the game is AT&T. It may be necessary to change phone sim to an AT&T network if you are on TracFone or the Walmart offering. Your old phone might work on AT&T because this is newer GSM and LTE (4G service). My Original Verizon Google Pixel phone works on AT&T. A phone that is older and only 3G will not work. And only an AT&T phone will manage Wi-Fi calling on this network. It is something about the phone's ROM. Wi-Fi calling will not be an issue if you are under a good mobile signal.

The town had to report results of environmental testing we did in newly drilled test wells at the foreclosed-on McKnight property. We did not encounter the petrol related results that we feared based on the land's history. We did get reportable PFAS, a drinking water toxin. This may be from dumped roofing materials. We are working with EPA, the state DEP, and are being assisted by FRCOG with Brownfield funding. I have contacted all property owners within 500' and requested they get tested.

Dear Friends,

Way back in the mid to late '70's, Rev David Ray, then pastor of the Trinitarian Congregational Church, started a modest community newsletter as a mission of the church to the community. It was typed and run off on a mimeograph machine at the church by volunteers. Under the initial guidance of Judy Styles and Diana Tandy, that modest newsletter has become a valuable tool to keep the larger community informed about local events, the workings of Town government and local interests. Diana kept the newsletter going and growing until medical issues forced her to curtail much of her activity for a time.

Andrea Woods stepped up to help and in her first issue in 2004 she wrote, "thank you to Diana Tandy, Linda Gale and Betsy Lincoln for 25 yrs of editing". She reached out to others to help as the job became more time and energy demanding. Janet Alden took on the keeping of the books, Nancy Hickler took on the monthly printing at the Library and she and then Beth Anderson helped with proof reading. The Warwick Women's Guild continued to collate, label and mail the then hardcopy only Newsletter.

Beth Gilgun became involved sometime later when the Newsletter began selling ads for local businesses. That was more than any of those volunteering at the time wanted to take on and she did a great job. In 2018, Beth took on the full editorial and publishing responsibilities. She did that right up until she died suddenly Dec 19, 2021.

We owe all these women a huge **THANK YOU** for their dedication and commitment to this community and the monthly Newsletter that keeps us connected and informed about our community. There now are other ways of communicating that didn't exist for most of the Newsletter's life, but the Newsletter still remains a valuable source of Town news and information. Andrea and Beth Anderson are working hard to pull all the pieces together so this Newsletter can return after a month's disruption. It has been time consuming and at times frustrating because the thumb drive Beth worked from could not be found. The mailing list may be incomplete for this month, but if you know anyone who is not getting their usual format, please let us know. You can leave a message at the Chapel, with Andrea or with Nancy Kilhart.

At this time, I want to raise up Diana Tandy and Beth Gilgun in particular because they seem cut from the same cloth. They were involved in so many groups and organizations it's mind-boggling. Diana was active (and I mean ACTIVE) in the church, the Orange Community Band, Women's Guild, and other places I can't recall right now. She was a caring and nurturing person whose heart went out to those who struggled in life. She connected with people deeply; she consoled, counseled, cooked for them with love and compassion. And she put that same energy, love and commitment into all she did with the organizations she was a part of.

Beth was the same in many ways. She was one of the first contacts people new to Town had at the Town Hall. She was welcoming, helpful and pleasant; a fount of information and encouragement as Assessors clerk, Treasurer and probably other specified and unspecified jobs. She was always offering to help the church put on community suppers, organize and prepare food for weddings, funerals and other events special in people's lives. She cared. She was an accomplished seamstress and historian. She was deeply involved at Old Deerfield and the Petersham Rod & Gun Club, and yet there was always time to help those who needed help. Diana and Beth were the sort of people who make a town like Warwick a special place. And there are more like them out there in this special community we inhabit.

Now, we are looking for people who would like to keep the Newsletter alive. Andrea and Beth Anderson have developed some job descriptions and are willing to help get things rolling again, but not indefinitely. Much of the structure is still there and working. If you think you would like to help, let us know (and you DON'T have to be a woman to do this).

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
