Thus the tradition of poetry, the communication between souls, continues.

The goal of this workshop is to become knowledgeable about the process of writing poetry and to find joy in the accomplishment of that goal.



The Highland Street Foundation of Newton MA offers visitors no-cost admissions to many of the cultural venues in Massachusetts. This program was created to increase access and enrichment opportunities for children and families throughout Massachusetts during the summer months. Every Friday, from the end of June through the end of August, multiple sites are open for free.

For the past 2 years I have enjoyed picking one or two museums on a Friday and making a day of it. Most museums open at 10 AM but you can check, the Highland Street website (above) for the specifics of which venues are scheduled on specific Fridays. They also have links to the museums so you can see what is offered.

I have found many museums that I had never gone to before because of not knowing what they offer or just figured it was something I might not enjoy. Surprise! Found some real gems.

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TOWN COORDINATOR

Greetings from Selectboard and Town Coordinator, David Young

The Town is looking for residents to serve as Clock Winder, and to serve on the Finance Committee / Capital Planning Committee. The next round of appointments is in June.

After fifty years of stability in the position we are looking for a new Clock Winder. This is a Selectboard appointment. The current Clock Winder, Mr. A. George Day, is retiring after half a century of service, service for which we are most grateful. The clock needs to be wound weekly. There is significant physical exertion in addition to the individual being available every week. Some towns have as many as five people who rotate duty. It makes sense here in Warwick that there be at least a Winder and an alternate to meet the weekly demand. Talk among yourselves. We need a replacement by July 1. Athol Daily News has a nice You Tube video about the clock and George that is posted at http://atholdailynews.com/local-videos/exploring-warwick-town-clock

Our Finance Committee has two willing members and they need some cohorts. The finance committee makes recommendations on budget and Town Meeting Articles. They control our contingency fund, the Reserve Fund, advise the Treasurer on investments and would make recommendations on capital spending. It would help if we had a capital plan. We don't. The Selectboard is of the view that Capital needs and planning and the Finance Committee should be combined. We are looking for a few volunteers. This is a Moderator appointment.

On June 5 at 7 pm the Selectboard will hold a pole hearing for the Warwick Broadband petition to locate twelve town-owned 60' tall poles in places around town where the wireless signal needs to be boosted. Affected landowners will receive written notice of the hearing. We have contracted with Westfield Gas and Electric to set and dress the poles using an inter-municipal agreement which is saving a lot of money. Also in June we will get the customers connected to the cell tower at 900 MHz upgraded to the new gear. We have instituted a new billing system and are working out the wrinkles. And we are working on procurement of the LTE solution that the MBI grant makes possible.

Good news and bad news on the Gale Road bridge replacement. The good news is we have been awarded a \$500,000 Small Bridge Highway Grant. The bad news is that with all the environmental studies there isn't enough money or time to get it done this construction season. I recommend we backstop the project with \$100,000 from our annual highway grant so that we can get this moving. That will require Selectboard approval.

After much delay resulting from both weather and necessary community process, the Northfield Road pavement project, a mile of cold in place recycling, was accomplished. The project involved grinding the old pavement, adding emulsion, and laying the new roadbed. This will be followed by a period of curing and compaction and finally a layer of new pavement. This is the same process utilized on both Orange Road and Winchester Road.

Thanks to Dawn Magi for serving as Selectboard Chair for a very long stretch. The board reorganized and I have a new immediate supervisor, Lawrence "Doc" Pruyne who was elected Selectboard Chair. Thanks also to Don Matthews (write in Board of Health) and to David Shoemaker (write-in Cemetery Commission) for stepping up to fill vacancies.

Is it Worth it to Install Solar Electric Panels On Your House?

In my case, yes. In your case, maybe. Knowing the decision making factors and process might help you to save money, increase the value of your house, and produce less carbon dioxide. What follows is a description of the process my wife, Karro Frost, and I followed to install a solar system on our house last year.

in May, 2016, the Choose Solar Initiative group (CSI Warwick) hosted a presentation by solar system installers. Karro attended, learned about the hoops we needed to jump through, and met some installers. We interviewed several, and chose PV Squared to install a system on our house.

If we took out a solar loan to pay for the project, our income qualified us for a state funded 20% rebate, so we went in that direction. Several things beside the loan application needed to be done before we could apply and install our solar panels: an energy audit, an appraisal of the house, new roof shingles, certify that we had enough sunlight reaching the house, and clear 40 trees from the south side of the house. This was all accomplished by August 23rd. On September 28th, our loan was approved, and our solar system was installed by September 30th. The electrical inspector inspected it, and the system was turned on.

Our system consists of 33 panels on the roof, and an inverter in the cellar that feeds the electricity into the power lines. The system only works when the electric grid is working. If the power goes out, we still need a generator or battery backup. On our best days we will make about 70 kilowatt hours (kWhr) of electricity. On a bad day, we might make enough for a few light bulbs. Our average daily use between the woodworking shop and the house totals 30 kWhr. The result is that we have stopped paying for electricity, and are building up a credit. So far, we have made over 5.5 megawatt hours (MWhr, or 5,500 kWhr) of electricity.

An incentive program called SRECS II will pay us for producing this energy. For every 1000 kilowatt hours generated (nothing to do with use), we make 1 SREC (Solar Renewable Energy Credit). These SREC attributes are then sold at an energy market, but we still get to consume the electrical energy associated with the SRECs. The Electric Companies must buy a certain number of them to meet the state requirements for renewable energy. We will be generating SRECs for 10 years from when the system was turned on. According to the projections from the solar system installers, the SRECS, the income tax incentives (federal [30% of cost] and state [\$1000]), and what we will no longer have to pay for electricity monthly, will allow us to pay off our loan in five years, while having no electric bills.

Given that we also replaced the gas water heater, gas dryer, and gas stove with electric appliances this summer, our gas bill for the house has gone to zero. Installing an electric water boiler for the radiant heat system in the shop will reduce the shop gas bill. We have also added to the value of the house, because we will own the system outright, and the panels are supposed to last for at least 30 years.

Our house was oriented for solar gain when we built it in 1999. We were also able to clear trees that would shade the roof. The installer was able to accurately predict what we would produce, so it's worth talking to a professional to see what your situation looks like. If you are thinking of "going solar" then talk to an installer soon, as the incentives will change early next year.

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TRINITARIAN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH of WARWICK

JUNE 2017

Dear Friends.

Most Christians consider Pentecost to be the "Birthday" of the Christian church. It is described in the Book of the Book of Acts as a time when the twelve "Apostles", and many of the followers of Jesus, were gathered in Jerusalem for the celebration of the Jewish holiday of Shavuot. In the Jewish tradition, Passover commemorates the freeing of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, and Shavuot, seven weeks after the Passover, commemorates the reception of the Torah marking the Israelites as God's chosen people, having committed to living according to God's law.

Passover and Easter, Shavuot and Pentecost are intimately tied together. One of the central images of Passover is the Pascal Lamb, a young lamb or goat without blemish, that is sacrificed and its blood painted on the doorway to instruct the Angel of Death to pass over that household and allowing the Israelites to flee from harsh and oppressive slavery in Egypt. In the Easter tradition, Jesus is the "Lamb of God" the pure sacrifice offered by a forgiving God to free humanity from slavery to corrupt power and injustice. It is offered in the prophetic spirit of Amos and Isaiah who spoke God's words to a nation that had forsaken justice in favor of "security" and righteousness in favor of comfort; "I have had enough of burnt offerings…I do not delight in the blood of bulls or of lambs…cease to do evil, learn to do good; seek justice, correct oppression, defend the fatherless, plead for the widow." And from Amos; "…let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream."

Franciscan monk and theologian, Fr Richard Rohr explains it this way; "Humans have always struggled to deal with fear and evil by ways other than forgiveness, most often through sacrificial systems...People who haven't come to at least a minimal awareness of their own dark side will always find someone else to hate or fear. Hatred holds a group together much more quickly and easily than love and inclusivity...Someone has to be blamed, attacked, tortured, imprisoned or killed. Sacrificial systems create religions and governments of exclusion and violence...Sadly, the history of violence and the history of religion are almost the same...

Shavuot symbolizes the acceptance to live according to a given set of moral guidelines, external laws. Pentecost symbolizes the acceptance of the guidance of the Holy Spirit within each individual. These are more complimentary than competing, more inclusive than exclusive; steps along a path toward a common goal, and yet we humans have found ways to use them to justify division and conflict.

Again, Fr Rohr:"We are generally inclined to either create victims of others or play the victim ourselves, both of which are no solution but only perpetuate the problem. Jesus instead shows us how to hold the pain... until it transforms him into a higher state, which we rightly call the risen life... Picture yourself before the crucified Jesus; recognize that he became what you fear; nakedness, exposure, vulnerability and failure... He became what we do to one another in order to free us from the lie of punishing and scapegoating...He became the crucified so we would stop crucifying...Imagine...Jesus' invitation from the cross;

My beloved, I am your self. I am your beauty. I am your goodness, which you are destroying. I am what you do to what you should love. I am what you are afraid of: your deepest and best and most naked self – your soul. Your sin largely consists in what you do to harm goodness – your own and others'. You are afraid of the good; you are afraid of me. You kill what you should love; you hate what could transform you. "

Instead of celebrating Pentecost as the birth of a new religious entity, we could celebrate it as rising to a new level of love, forgiveness and acceptance, of ourselves and others, incorporating the love common to all the major religions and allowing God's Spirit of love to lead us into a life filled with less fear and hatred and more compassion and generosity.

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
