Pandemic update: At press time, the Library remains closed to the public but continues to offer curbside delivery of trash bags, books, movies, CDs, magazines and loaner items ("library of things") during regular hours. Inter-library loans have begun again at some larger libraries, and Warwick may see some delivery in July of outstanding requests. Much attention is being given to the process of gradually re-opening the building for patrons to browse—stay tuned.

Anti-racism materials: I've received numerous lists of online anti-racism resources for kids, teens and adults. I'll be putting some on the Library's web page, but please let me know if you'd like any of the lists/links.

Tuesday, July 21st @ 7 pm - Zoom presentation by author Serena Burdick: Burdick is an international bestselling author whose most recent book is *The Girls With No Names* (2020). The action takes place in the Gilded Age of New York City in the 1910s, "when suffragettes marched in the street, unions fought for better work conditions—and girls were confined to the House of Mercy for daring to break the rules." The New York Times Book Review wrote: "The last page seems to come too soon." Register for the Zoom call by contacting the Library by July 20th at 4 pm.

Kid's movies at the Northfield Drive-In: Supporting the Summer Reading Program's theme of mythology-folklore-fantasy, a different film will be shown each Wednesday at 8:30 pm, starting June 29th. **You must buy a ticket at the Library**: \$2.50 for age 15+, \$1 for ages 7-14, and free to 6 and under. Tickets will be sold the week before the showing and must be purchased and picked up by Monday at 11 am. The number of vehicles will be limited due to Covid-19 restrictions.

The theater concession stand will open at 6:30pm. They will have concession runners delivering food orders, and everyone is welcome to come in costume AND decorate their cars. People can be mask-less outside of their cars as long as they stay in their spot; **everyone must wear a mask when away from their car space**.

On the 4th of July, we celebrate the "birth", in 1776, of the United States as a sovereign nation. In 1863, Abraham Lincoln began his Gettysburg Address with, "Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." Ten months earlier, January 1, 1863, Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation. After the Civil War ended, that proclamation was difficult to enforce in the former Confederate States, but on June 19, 1865, Union Army General Gordon Granger issued General Orders #3 proclaiming all enslaved persons in Texas, the most remote slave state, were free. This is the date celebrated by many as "Juneteenth", or Emancipation day. I wonder how many of us are aware of this holiday and what it celebrates. I wasn't until the recent demonstrations and the Black Lives Matter movement. But then, there is an awful lot that I, or many of us who enjoy the status of our white privilege, don't know or have given much thought to.

Emily Dickinson's poem expresses the idea that life is too short to waste on hatred and yet here we are, still embroiled in a struggle to break out of the grip of hatred that we as a nation have time and again repudiated. 244 years after the Declaration of Independence, 157 years after the Emancipation Proclamation, 57 years after Rev Dr Martin Luther King Jr gave his "I have a dream" speech, we are still struggling with a racist legacy that denies our stated ideals as a nation. The poet Maya Angelou speaks to this struggle, "You may encounter many defeats, but you must not be defeated. In fact it may be necessary to encounter the defeats, so you can know who you are, what you can rise from, how you can still come out of it."

The resurfacing of overt hatred, the visible disproportionate impact of the Covid-19 virus on black, indigenous and people of color (BICOP), the recurring specter of police violence and the concentration of environmental impacts on poor communities have been defeats, but they may lead us to define who we are as a people, as a nation. We can rise from this morass. We can be a great nation, but the path to greatness is not through intimidation and violence, it is through self-examination, determination and persistence.

These are dark times, but Valerie Kaur sees the potential in the darkness; "The mother in me asks, what if? What if this darkness is not the darkness of the tomb, but the darkness of the womb? What if our America is not (dying) but is a country waiting to be born?"

The Christian faith, along with most other world faith traditions, holds that humanity is given the possibility, the responsibility to be co-creators with God of a new world in which love, compassion and justice are the hallmarks of life and the forces of death and destruction are ultimately defeated.

In his farewell address to the Israelites before his death, Moses tells the people, "...I have set before you life and death, blessing and curse; therefore choose life that you and your descendants may live..." We have a choice to make as a society and a nation. Let's choose to live with justice, compassion and hope for all people, all life.

WARWICK ANNOUNCES NEW ELECTRICITY PROGRAM USING 100% GREEN ENERGY

Residents and small businesses combined will save \$136,000

WARWICK, MA – Striving to be part of the climate change solution, the Town of Warwick is pleased to announce the start of its green energy municipal aggregation program that will help to increase the creation and use of renewable energy in Massachusetts.

In August 2020, Warwick will begin a 41-month term with Colonial Power Group and electricity supplier Dynegy Energy Services in support of the Warwick Community Choice Power Supply program. The program will allow Warwick's electricity ratepayers to buy, through the purchase of **National Wind Renewable Energy Certificates (or RECs),** 100% wind power to light up their homes and businesses. A separate "opt-in" program will allow interested ratepayers to use energy derived from 100% Mass Class I Renewable Energy Certificates. Benefits to choosing "local" energy include:

Building local renewable energy capacity Creating local green energy sector employment opportunities Supporting the local economy Enhancing environmental sustainability

"We all recognize that bold action is needed to reduce our carbon footprint and improve our environment," said Warwick Town Coordinator David Young. "By working together, our communities are able to get more affordable electricity prices for residents, bring additional local renewable energy to Franklin County, and help support the Massachusetts green jobs sector."

The Warwick electricity program will result in a combined savings of more than \$136,000 for the Town's residential and small business ratepayers over the term of the contract. Warwick joined with 11 other Franklin County communities and the Town of Huntington to combine their buying power and achieve better pricing for electricity ratepayers in all 13 towns.

Warwick ratepayers can expect the Community Choice Power Supply program to begin with the August 2020 meter reads (reflected in customers' September 2020 billings). Billing, power, and customer service will not be interrupted. The one small change will be that Dynegy Energy Services, the selected electricity supplier for the Warwick Community Choice program, will be printed under "Supply Services" on National Grid's monthly bills. National Grid will continue to send one bill to each ratepayer, which will contain the cost of both supply and distribution.

The Warwick Community Choice Power Supply program is an "opt-out" program, which means Warwick residents and small businesses currently on National Grid's Basic Service do not need to take any action to participate in this green energy program. However, the optional program that includes the use of 100% MA Class I RECs is an "opt-in" program, meaning Warwick ratepayers must request that they be enrolled. Choosing this (slightly) higher cost option will add about \$10 to the current average monthly electric bill, less in the winter and more in the summer.

It is important to note that any ratepayer with a supplier block on their electricity account must contact National Grid to ask to have the block removed or they cannot be enrolled in Warwick's electricity program. Also, anyone who already has a contract with a competitive supplier will not be automatically switched. Residents can opt to switch from a contract with a competitive supplier but may be subject to penalties or early termination fees charged by that supplier. Ratepayers should verify terms with their competitive supplier before switching.

The Warwick Community Choice Power Supply program has no fees or charges for either the standard green energy program or higher renewable energy program or for opting out of the program entirely. Residents and small business owners are free to opt-in or opt-out of the Warwick electricity program at any time.

Basic Service rates change twice a year or more, depending on rate class. As a result, the aggregation rate may not always be lower than the Basic Service rate. The goal of the aggregation is to deliver savings over the life of the program against National Grid Basic Service. However, such savings and future savings cannot be guaranteed.

Communities have been aggregating electricity since a provision of a 1997 law allowed towns and cities to negotiate directly with power suppliers on behalf of their residents. Since then, more than 150 Massachusetts communities have initiated municipal aggregation programs.

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
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
