Coordinator Report-David Young

At the most recent Selectboard meeting which was held 7/19 the board discussed the recently voted state of emergency and the storm damage to our roads. During the discussion, our risk matrix for the municipal vulnerability plan (MVP) in its final form was reviewed. It was highly predictive. The Selectboard recognize the FRCOG planning department and in particular Alyssa Larose and Helena Farrell who led the joint Northfield / Warwick process to completion.

We got rain and storm damage. MEMA, the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency and Rep Whipps have reached out to assist. MEMA brough a trailer full of supplies such as orange cones. We are documenting the damage in storm assessments. While it is unlikely there will be assistance to homeowners, save your receipts just in case. Two days after the storm nobody is stranded without some way out of their home by car. And it is raining again.

There is a lot of federal funding heading our state's way. Some brainstorming was done to suggest or advise Representative Whipps of our infrastructure priorities. It seems the most desirable outcome would be restoration of the old Federal Revenue Sharing so we could address many identified and arguably infrastructure needs from a pothole or sidewalks to culvert replacement and air handlers for town hall. Our broader advice is funds for roads, bridges, and culverts; funds for broadband including more hotspots; money for historic preservation of buildings and contents; dry hydrants for firefighting; electric car charging stations; road safety planning including library parking, and many said working mobile cell phone service. A priority was placed on getting air handlers in the dining hall area of town hall.

We are completing a tuition agreement with Pioneer. We would pay a fee to them for junior and senior high school students who want to attend. Kids can still go to (FCTS) the tech school or choice out. We are exiting the district's membership. We are leaving under the longstanding District agreement. We have a history of 70 years with Pioneer and this contracted relationship seems the better alternative to provide for our older kids. Especially in face of a new district agreement that would require the agreement of the other member towns we leave. We left by following the current district agreement, by voting at Town Meeting to leave. We think we can well operate a very small elementary school but do not aspire to be a very tiny high school.

The biggest hurdle in leaving the Pioneer District for us is how to handle our share of the liability to retired school district employees. The Town of Warwick does not offer retiree health insurance. If we did, it would cover seven town positions and the town would have a liability for post-employment benefits of about \$1 million in future payments. The town has some pension liabilities and pay about \$80k annually to the county retirement system to move closer to fully funded. At the school district the current year expenditures are budgeted, and the cost apportioned to each town based on an averaging formula as part of the assessment to the towns for education. The retiree cost we meet each year is the "current" liability. There is also a big future liability. For the Pioneer District it is about \$30 million. We own between six and ten percent of the amount. Do we try to calculate that future value / liability and cash out? That could take \$3 million. The other way is to continue to figure out the allocation each year and we pay our actual share. There would be employees of our old district who have basis both with and without Warwick in their retirement calculation. This continued and apportioned participation in the old district's retirement obligation makes the most sense to me. Calculation and cash out have its appeal for the finality; but we or the district could have buyer's remorse if there is ever single payer health insurance on one hand or significant inflation on the other.

In the next month or days, the Selectboard will be evaluating acting fire chief Larson to make his chief appointment permanent.

Book Review - The New Climate War, by Michael Mann (2021): Get ready to get pissed off, then get up and "join the fight to take back our planet" (the subtitle). Michael Mann is a celebrated, straight-talking atmospheric scientist, much persecuted by the powerful vested interests that have successfully used the same tactics that the tobacco industry deployed to keep the public confused, divided, and in despair about the climate crisis. He calls out the front groups, corporations and lobbyists that remain aligned in defense of the fossil fuel industry, those who want us to think that individual actions will suffice to fix this, and even those who propose it is too late to do anything.

True, he admits, we do have to take personal actions that go beyond light bulbs and recycling, but this is a bigger problem that requires government and industry intervention, collective action and cooperation across the globe. A tall order for sure, but are we up for it? He is inspired by the young folks all over the world, and simply asks us not to be an "inactivist" or a doomsayer, and to roll up our sleeves for the fight of our lives, and the lives of future generations of living beings. You can trust this scientist.

Green Corner

In follow-up to the last GC article, I'm pleased to give a great report on my Mass Save audit. Rosie the lab happily greeted our energy specialist, Allan Butler from CLEAResult, hoping to get a plan for relief from high summer temps and crazy humidity in her mostly-shaded home. Allan offered very comprehensive and user-friendly information, focusing on my question of options regarding an upgrade to a very old A/C unit in the bedroom.

Replacing the ancient A/C unit with an energy-efficient model was never mentioned; instead, a minisplit (or heat pump) was recommended as the solution to cooling the house. Rather than being confined to one room for consistent temps and easy breathing, Rosie could be comfortable throughout the house. In addition, the mini-split would act as a dehumidifier and be a primary heating alternative to my wood stove. Use of the stove could be reduced as years pass and the process of heating with wood becomes more physically challenging.

The mini-split industry is now hugely busy, so it's important to get as many quotes as possible. Bids for installation will be "all over the place," so look for the most reasonable cost. The work must be done by a licensed professional in order to receive the Mass Save rebate (which is \$1250 per ton, measured by the size of the space you're covering.) He recommended getting the humidifier feature but not to be talked into getting extra heat elements for use in lower temps, as they're not efficient. He also said Mitsubishi, Fujitsu, and Daikin are the best performers.

The rep wrapped up the two-hour audit with a quick walk-through of the house, checking to see that no areas were overlooked (for insulation) during the original 2013 audit. He even gave me an inexpensive solution for repair and insulation of a failing wooden basement door and spotted a compromised area of the attic roof which needs attention.

The heat pump loans are available at zero interest. After more research and getting bids, I'll know what this investment will cost. Neighbors who've taken this step all report being very satisfied with the results of their mini-splits. For now, Rosie and friends are voting with two paws up.

After a great couple hours at Moore State Park in Paxton, MA, we took a short jaunt down the road to Black & White Grille where we had a great turkey dinner. Fresh carved white turkey breast over homemade stuffing, gravy and served with homemade mashed potatoes and veggies. Their menu is huge with everything from sandwiches, burgers, fish, pork, poultry, pasta and lots of desserts. They also have an ice cream window. We ate inside as it was rather hot but they have plenty of outdoor seating too.

The service was excellent and the food delicious. I had enough to take a plate home for another meal. Even got refills on the lemonade. Highly recommend this place after maybe a walk through Moore State Park (see below) or a stop at St. Joseph's Abbey, a community of Trappist Monks.

Moore State Park spans 400 acres of paths and hiking trails. Between the 18th and early 20th centuries, it was home to grist and saw mills. Today, visitors come to glimpse its popular waterfalls and cascades of flower blooms. Other attractions include the stone mill foundations, a restored sawmill, and networks of wooded paths. They have built a lovely bridge over the dam and have chairs to sit and watch nature. We walked the whole grounds that are tarred then took the Azalea Path but the flowers were just about done for the season. But some of the Mountain Laurel was out. It is a great place for a leisurely stroll. It's only about an hour from Warwick.

Get \$25 Worth of Farmer's Market Coupons for Free!

Craving some fresh zucchini or ripe strawberries? **LifePath** will be distributing 625 free farmer's market coupon booklets worth \$25 each. One of these coupon booklets could be yours! The coupons are part of a program from the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, designed to help elders get fresh, local fruits and vegetables and to help local farmers sell more produce. **In order to be eligible for the coupon booklets, you must be at least 60 years old and earn \$23,828 or less as an individual or \$32,227 or less as a couple.** For each additional family member please add \$8,399 to the income limit. You will need to sign your name to attest that you meet the criteria to receive a coupon booklet. You do not need to attend a senior center or participate in any other programs to be eligible.

Each booklet contains 10 coupons worth \$2.50 each. Please note that no cash can be given as change, so you may want to bring small bills and coins so you can pay the difference instead of using only part of the value of an additional coupon. Coupons will only be accepted by participating farmers at farmer's markets or farm stands. Please check with each vendor to find out if they accept the coupons. The coupons do not expire until October 31, 2021. Each person can only receive one coupon booklet per year. You can use your coupons to buy fruits, vegetables, fresh-cut herbs, and honey. Other types of items for sale at the markets cannot be purchased with the coupons.

Warwick School Renewal News - August 2021

What's happening:

The second of two **3-week youth** <u>sessions</u> supported by Antioch University will be completed by the end of July. This summer session focused on forest & field environments. Summer program director Brian Snell said the programs have really shown the advantages of multi-age classrooms, with older children helping younger in a cooperative atmosphere. These will be a key part of the curriculum for the school when it is re-opened in 2022. Carlee Mills, an intern with Antioch University, has been helping run this summer's program. Many volunteers have supported the program including Janice Starmer, Amber Holloway, Clare Green and Tracey Kirley. Recorder writer Zack DeLuca described the program in this <u>article</u>.

Warwick representatives continue to work on the town's **long-range educational plan**. A draft section on enrollment was submitted to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and feedback received on 3 previously submitted draft sections. Another meeting with DESE is in the works for August. The town is also actively working on tuition and transition agreements with Pioneer Valley Regional School District.

The planning continues for the **Pavilion/Amphitheater and Outdoor Classroom** at the Warwick Community School. The Selectboard approved a design for 24' x 30' timber frame structure, as described in this Recorder <u>article</u> by Zack DeLuca. A request for quotes for a timber frame package have been solicited and planning for the site work and concrete work are in process. The wide 24' opening will face the amphitheater hillside. The sides and ends will have substantial overhangs.

The Pavilion fund appeal, begun in December, has already raised over \$7000. Many thanks to the numerous Warwick residents and supporters from near and far!!

Dear Friends,

'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.' ... so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' "John 6: 9-12

Rev Richard Rohr proposes that "the whole movement of the Bible is toward ever-greater Incarnation and embodiment, until the mystery of mutual indwelling is finally experienced and enjoyed even here, even in this world, in this life, and in this body...For Christians, Jesus, the Christ, is the ultimate symbol of this divine goal, pattern and embodiment...Henceforth we know our true and lasting life in the new "force field" that (the Apostle) Paul calls the Body of Christ, webbed together by the Holy Spirit."

The image of God as a "force field", an energy, captures my imagination much more fully than the image of God as a super-sized human with a singular gender and all the habits, quirks and constraints of a human personality. Energy moves, flows; it isn't easily contained, but we can perceive the flow, we can join into that flow and "miracles" can happen. The boy offers what little he has and five thousand people are fed with some left over. Was this a miracle of material expansion, magic? Was this because the boy's generosity inspired others to share what they had? Was this just an allegory, a hypothetical illustration of an inner, spiritual quest? If we think of God as flowing, creative energy it could be any or all of these.

Rev Cameron Trimble recently wrote of feeling overwhelmed by the physical and emotional negativity of these days we are living in; climate catastrophes, political upheaval, animosity, disinformation and distrust. Then she discovered the work of Joanna Macy, "an ecophilosopher, scholar of Buddhism, general systems theory and deep ecology. (Who) lives at the edge of despair and hope..." Macy employs the term "Active Hope" which she says is a practice that we do rather than have. "Active Hope is a readiness to discover the strengths in ourselves and in others; a readiness to discover the reasons for hope and the occasions for love; a readiness to discover the size and strength of our hearts... our love for life...the unsuspected deep well of patience and diligence...our capacity to lead. None of this can be discovered in an armchair or without risk."

Trimble continues, "So much of our world is hard to look at. So much breaks our hearts. But that's where we begin...Active Hope is about staring directly into the heartbreak, seeing the change that needs to be manifest and getting to work to make it so. Active Hope is fierce. It's honest. It's brave."

The first step is taking a wide, holistic view of our current situation, not a narrow, myopic, what's-in-it-for-me view. The next step is discerning if the direction is in sync with the flow of God's energy, positive and creative, or negative and destructive? Once we discern the flow, we can join in the creative process and be the "small boy" who offers what he has, allowing the free flow of the Holy Spirit's "force field" to work miracles of regeneration and healing.


